



Occlusion of artery and veins. Smaller version is called mosquito forceps



To hold the arteries Lighting the major vascular pedicles




Similar to curved artery forceps



Used to visualise the rectum and anal canal Outer part is the handle Inner part is the obturator Contraindicated in fissure in ano






Short, straight and has multiple holes








Czerny retractor (this is correct name) - the bottom one is only czerny retractor Double hooked retractor


To retract skin superficially for all abdominal and thyroid surgeries






Used to retract the abdominal wall after the peritoneum is opened






Holds intestine during resection and anastomoses and Fallopian tubes Has no tooth at the end






Control bleeding from arteries veins and capillaries Used in suturing to hold needle

Can be used to grasp tough tissues












Also called Double action nibbler


Top jaw is used for cutting and the lower jaw is used for holding the tissue firmly To smoothen the bone end after amputation and to cut the ribs













Moynihan's straight occlusion intestinal clamp













Long, curved and has two holes Temporary drainage
